



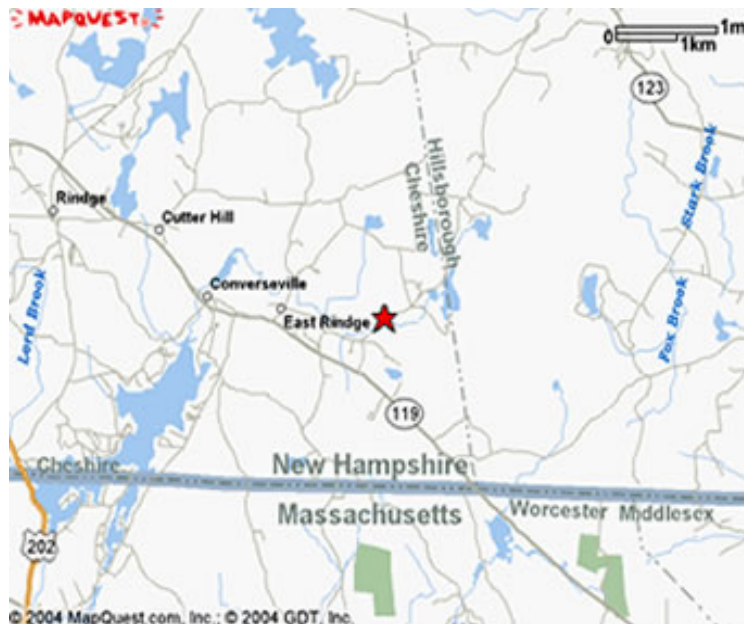
Natural and Historic Resources

Hampshire Country School's remarkable 1700 acre rural property is the heart of the school and a source of recreation, renewal, and pride. In the late 1700s it was farms. In the late 1800s it was a privately owned agricultural and industrial community. In the middle 1900s it became a school.

The property includes three ponds (Mill Pond, Island Pond, and Stump Pond) which range in size from a few acres to 39 acres. It covers hundreds of acres of deep forest, open fields, wetlands and the Pratt Peak and Stonytop portions of Barrett Mountain. It includes the most remarkable collection of old stone walls and foundations in New Hampshire. The western half of the property holds the headwaters of the Miller's River, a major tributary of the Connecticut River. The land supports a large variety of wildlife including beaver, deer, wild turkey, moose, mink, otter, coyotes, bobcats, and many other mammals, reptiles, amphibians, and birds. The lakes contain an abundance of pickerel and bass.

This remarkable setting provides students an opportunity to live and learn in the quiet of a rural environment and to hike, camp, canoe, snowshoe, study nature, and explore forests and wetlands, all without having to pack into a car or leave campus.

Hampshire Country School is located off route 119 east of East Rindge in the Monadnock region of southwestern New Hampshire, 30 miles east of Vermont, and one mile north of Massachusetts.

It is 65 miles from Logan Airport in Boston, and 45 miles from the Manchester, NH, airport.

Buildings and Facilities

Located at the central portion of the school campus are the Main House, with classrooms, offices, music room, library, and dining room; the Coach House, with classrooms, a woodshop, and faculty housing; the Boat House, with two student dorms and faculty housing; a small theater; and a barn. The central area also has a tennis court and several mowed fields and hills for informal sports, capture the flag, sledding, and a variety of other outdoor games and activities. Farther away but within walking distance are two additional student dorms, Mill House and Deer Run, each with abundant space for outdoor games and activities. Each student dorm has a full size kitchen, a living room, and single and double student bedrooms.
